About Us

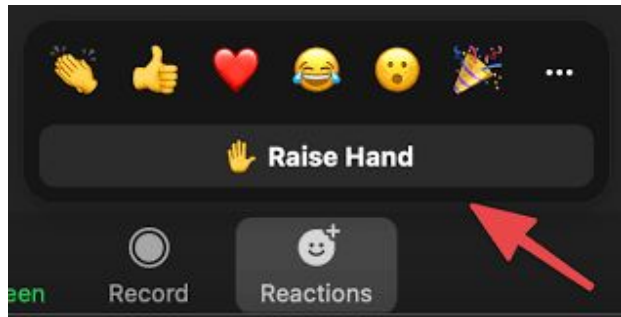
Partnership for Children & Youth believes all children need opportunities to learn beyond the school day and year to build skills and relationships, expand their horizons, access social capital, and discover their passions.

High Quality Summer Programs

Summer programs offer an opportunity for fun, community building, exploration, and learning, in ways both different from and complementary to the regular school-year experience.

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Quality Matters

Quality is well-defined in summer programs – whether in-person or virtual. The Wallace Foundation, in partnership with the RAND Corporation and others, has published a wealth of evaluations, research, and tools that dive deep into the core elements of impactful summer programs.

Over the last decade, they have found the strongest results from the following practices:

- Offering voluntary, no-cost summer programs over multiple summers with free transportation and meals
- Providing at least five, preferably six, weeks of academic and enrichment programming with three hours of daily high-quality academic instruction
- Ensuring strong attendance (75%), small class sizes, and curricula aligned with the school year to impact the level and longevity of positive student outcomes
- Implementing summer youth employment programs that can have a range of positive outcomes

The Weikart Center for Youth Program Quality has spent decades researching key program quality elements in out-of-school-time programs. Many summer learning programs across the country use this framework to design and assess program quality.

Youth Engagement (youth voice in planning and reflection)	Safe Environment (structure and clear limits)
Peer Interaction (building community, cooperative learning, homework help)	Youth Voice and Choice
Supportive Environment (active learning, ask-listen-encourage, reframing conflict)	

Positive Summer Climate

Positive site climate drives student daily experiences and enjoyment of the program and is correlated with higher student attendance.

A program's climate reflects site norms, goals, values, relationships, teaching and learning practices and organizational structures.

Positive Summer Climate

Warm & Welcoming Environment

A warm and welcoming environment helps students feel safe, appreciated and bonded with staff and peers. In a positive site climate, students and staff know what to expect and what is expected of them.

- ❖ Clarity
- ❖ Consistency
- ❖ Warmth
- ❖ Engagement

Program Values & Norms

Develop a clear, positive message of summer site culture and communicate it with staff and students.

- ❖ Rituals & Events
- ❖ Student Incentives and Recognition
- ❖ Morning meetings
- ❖ Themes, Songs and Chants

ELO-P enables **full-day programs** (nine hour day) to be offered and for more students to be served **free of charge**

- Unique learning opportunities

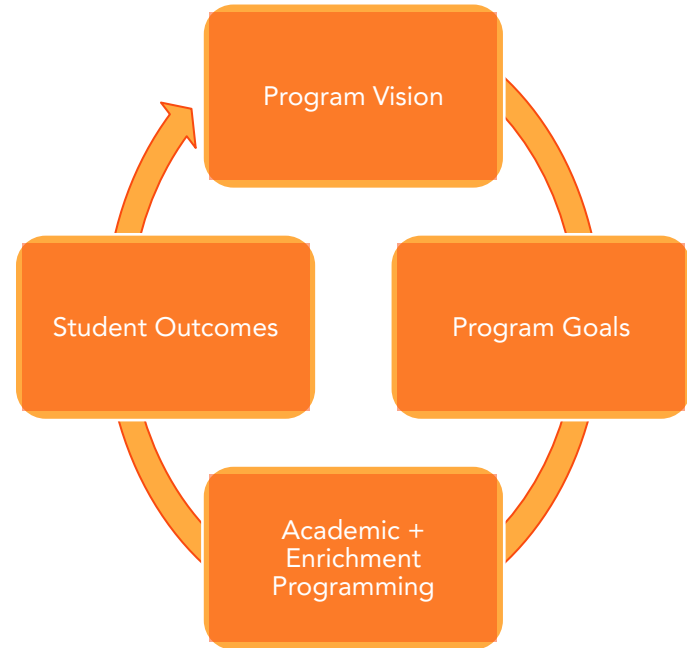
Recommendations:

- Begin planning early
- Survey students and caregivers to identify and build on program strengths and opportunities for growth, including new enrichment activities.
- Include all essential partners, both internal (within the district) and external (community-based organizations) in your planning

High Quality Enrichment

If programs are to provide engaging enrichment experiences for students, they must be as well planned and as high quality as the academics.

1. Select a model for providing enrichment programming/activities
2. Ensure that enrichment instructors have strong content knowledge
3. Train enrichment instructors in behavior support strategies and monitor their implementation
4. Plan lessons to include sequenced activities
5. Plan carefully if enrichment is integrated with academics
6. Keep class sizes small.



Partnerships for Enrichment

Effective Partnerships are ones in which there is a **shared value proposition**.

The goal of partnering with individuals and organizations in the community is to gain input, bring in missing expertise, and make connections with the community for the **ultimate outcome of strengthening the community and the program**.

Partnerships can...

- Improve program quality
- Create a more efficient use of resources
- Expand your organizational capacity
- Broaden the scope of your programming
- Strengthen community connection
- Build cultural awareness and identity

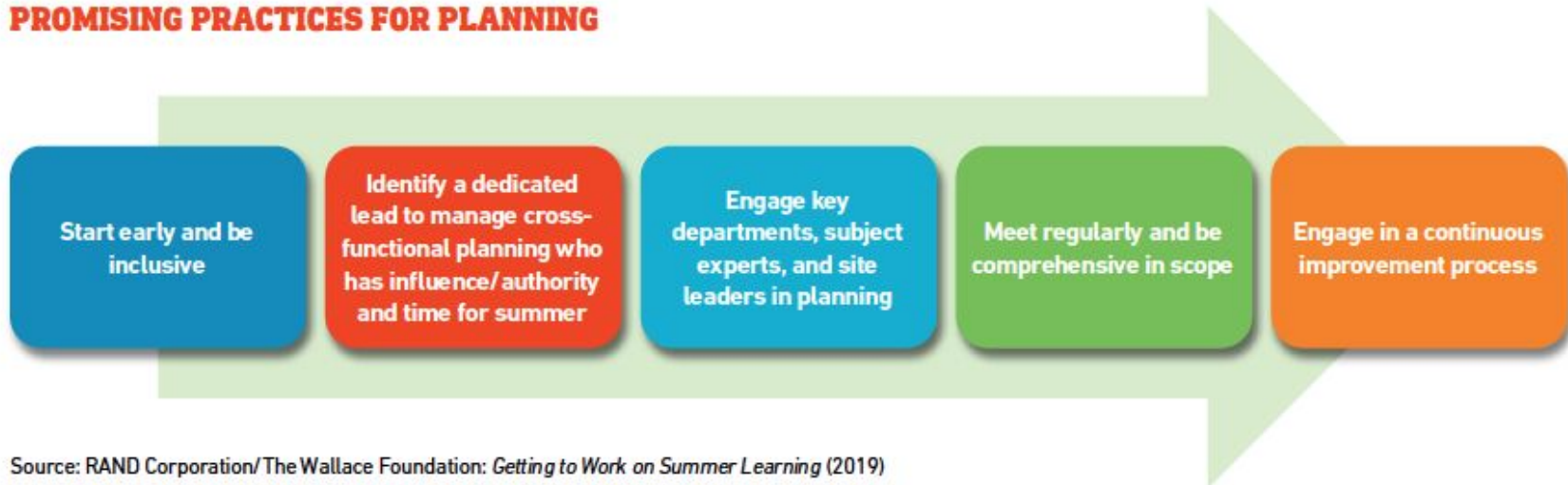
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Planning Early...Where Should You Be?

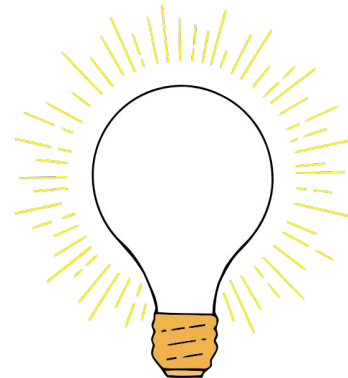


Planning Early...Where Should You Be?

Summer programs should not be all or nothing, or one-size-fits-all. As illustrated by research, program quality - including staff development, appropriate curriculum, positive climate, partnerships, and alignment with school year - is essential in making the most of summer. The cornerstone of making this happen is planning for a shared vision of success.

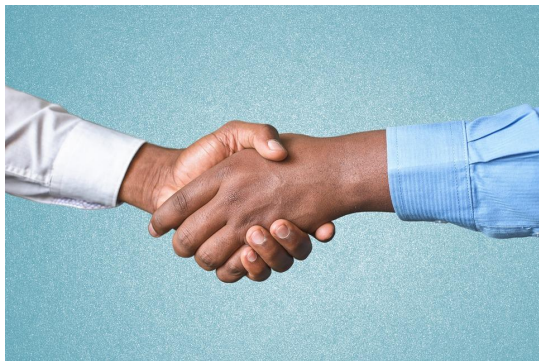
The Early Stages:

Stage 2: January-March	Update or develop policies and procedures, parent/staff handbooks, forms, applications, emergency plans, etc.
	Determine location, transportation, and any vendors needed for activities; start those conversations
	Update or develop job descriptions and your staff training plan
	Update or develop daily/weekly/monthly schedule for program, including field trips and special events; decide on themes if using
	Start to push out marketing materials (flyers, brochures); be sure to send to families from previous years
	Start staff recruitment: Invite rockstar staff from previous years to come back; advertise; reach out to local high schools, colleges, and workforce boards; start volunteer recruitment as well
	Start staff interviews

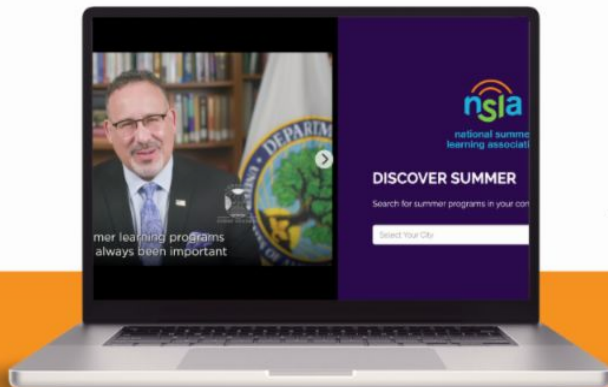
